Unusual Circumstances

If you indicated in Section C of this worksheet that there is an Unusual Circumstance surrounding your tax filing, please use the information below to determine the documents you must submit to the Office of Financial Aid, in addition to this worksheet, to complete the verification process.

Extension

- Individuals granted only the automatic six-month extension must use the IRS DRT in FAFSA on the web or submit an IRS Tax Return Transcript to the Office of Financial Aid after the return has been filed.
- Individuals granted a filing extension by the IRS beyond the automatic six-month extension for tax year 2019 must provide –
 - A copy of 2019 IRS's approval of an extension beyond the automatic six-month extension for tax year 2019;
 - Verification of Non-filing (VNF) Letter from the IRS dated on or after October 1, 2020 or a signed statement certifying that the individual attempted to obtain the VNF from the IRS and was unable to obtain the required documentation;
 - A copy of IRS Form W-2 for each source of 2019 employment income received or an equivalent document for tax year 2019 and,
 - If self-employed, a signed statement certifying the amount of the individual's Adjusted Gross Income (AGI) and U.S. income tax paid for tax year 2019.

Amended Return

An individual who amended an IRS Income Tax Return for tax year 2019 needs to provide the following documents:

- A signed copy of the 2019 IRS Form 1040X, in addition to one of the following:
 - IRS DRT information on FAFSA with all tax information from the original tax return; OR
 - A 2019 IRS Tax Return Transcript (that will only include information from the original tax return and does not
 have to be signed), or any other 2019 IRS tax transcript(s) that include all of the income and tax information
 required to be verified; OR
 - A signed copy of the 2019 IRS Form 1040 and the applicable schedules that were filed with the IRS.

Individuals Who Were Victims of IRS Tax-Related Identity Theft

An individual who was the victim of IRS tax-related identity theft must provide:

- A Tax Return DataBase View (TRDBV) transcript obtained from the IRS, or if unable to obtain a TRDBV, an equivalent document provided by the IRS or a copy of the signed 2019 income tax return and applicable schedules the individual filed with the IRS; *and*
- A statement signed and dated by the tax filer indicating that he or she was a victim of IRS tax-related identity theft and that the IRS is aware of the tax-related identity theft.

Filed Non-IRS Income Tax Returns

A tax filer who filed an income tax return with a tax authority other than the IRS may provide a signed copy
of his or her income tax return that was filed with the relevant tax authority. However, if we question the
accuracy of the information on the signed copy of the income tax return, the tax filer must provide us with a
copy of the tax account information issued by the relevant tax authority before verification can be completed.
