NDNU Graduates Rise to the Top During Time of Great Challenge

NDNU's 170th Commencement Ceremony on Saturday, May 7th, was an especially joyous event. On a windy but otherwise perfect morning, over 250 faculty, staff, family members, and friends gathered to celebrate the 99 students receiving credentials and master's degrees in the first inperson graduation ceremony in three years. Mario Rendon, Susan Charles, and John Astin were honored with this year's George M. Keller Teaching Excellence Award. Faculty members are nominated by the students in each school, and the award recipient is chosen by a selection committee including previous winners.

City of Belmont Mayor Julia Mates presented community service and leadership awards to three students – Charmaine Bridgens, Daniel Martin, and Maureen Anchondo - who "gave above and beyond in making our community a better place through their volunteerism."

This year's commencement speaker Patricia Camacho-Fuentes cited the ongoing support from fellow classmates, NDNU faculty and staff as instrumental to her successes, especially with COVID looming in the background. "The professors in the Clinical Psychology program trained me professionally ... and also encouraged me to be a better person, to be an active agent of change in my community, in my home and inside myself. Many things have changed over these three years, but our sense of community is still here, stronger than ever!"
